As we come to the end of one year and the beginning of a new one, it is good to reflect on how God has worked in our lives—both together and individually. God has moved me to take discipleship more seriously and to adopt a more Biblical approach to disciple-making. According to Ben Sobels and Bill Hull in their book *The Discipleship Gospel Workbook*, a disciple is someone who is learning to live with Jesus and to love others like Jesus. Living and loving with and like Jesus means making disciples who also live and love in the same way.

Bill and Ben also define disciple-making as "Jesus' intentional process of servant-leadership training that multiplies disciples a few at a time to build up the church and advance God's kingdom throughout the world." This process involves training people to go and do, which was Jesus' model. Jesus called 12 men to follow Him with the intention that they would go and do the same. He invested in them, teaching them through shared life experiences. Among the 12, He focused more intensely on three—Peter, James, and John—who formed His inner circle and witnessed things the others did not. This is the model I have been using with the discipleship groups that have been meeting since June.

We began by redefining the Gospel, as many people do not fully understand what it is. The Gospel consists of four statements followed by three actions. The four statements are: **The Kingdom of God is at hand, Jesus came as the King (the Christ), He died and rose on the third day according to Scripture,** and **the response to the Gospel is to repent, believe, and follow Jesus.** Following Jesus means doing all He commanded, which includes making disciples of all nations. Those disciples, in turn, are to make disciples. According to ECO, this cycle is a mark of a flourishing church.

With all that in mind, how did you do with my challenge at the beginning of the year to invest in one person and invite them into the covenant we share here at First Presbyterian Church? In my February sermon, I challenged everyone to invest in one person and invite them to church. The goal was to have 200 people gathering on a Sunday morning for our 200th anniversary. Growing the church happens through the Holy Spirit working in and through all of you who invest in people and love as Jesus loved. It is not solely the responsibility of Rev. Dobi or myself—it requires all of us working together.

As we enter the new year and celebrate our 200th anniversary, can we commit to taking discipleship more seriously? Can we truly invest in our church and our community for the sake of Christ? The anniversary motto is "Generations of Faith." Is that truly visible on Sunday mornings? Are all generations equally represented? For "all generations" to be accounted for, we must intentionally invest in others beyond our own.

In the new year, we must work together to achieve many goals and to celebrate God's work in this town over the past 200 years. While it is wonderful that many of you serve individually, there is also a need for greater community collaboration. As we move forward, let's take an inventory of what we have been doing and discern what needs improvement, removal, or addition.

Bill and Ben, in their book *The Discipleship Gospel*, write:

"Sunday services, small groups, children's ministry, youth ministry, young adults' ministry, men's ministry, women's ministry, senior ministry, serving opportunities, and community outreach—all these ministries advance a church's disciple-making efforts. The trick is learning how they all fit together and defining their specific discipleship purpose. Stating the discipleship purpose of a specific ministry isn't easy, but it's worth it. Lastly, we urge you to define the discipleship purpose of each ministry in your church so that all your members can grow to understand how everything your church does seeks to fulfill Christ's Great Commission (Matt. 28:18-20)."

May the new year be filled with new opportunities for discipleship.

When she is not in church, you may find her working in her flower garden, attending a study class at Jamestown, reading or cross stitching. She also listens to all kinds of music from classical to country. Karen felt God calling her back to her home church to reactivate former relationships at First Presbyterian Church. She also cites her mother and grandmother Redfoot as influential in her life. Karen says, "They were strong, independent women with a solid personal relationship with Jesus Christ." Bible Verse: As I read and study my favorite keeps changing. God has so many glorious words that inspire and challenge me.

Closest to God: Every day presents an opportunity for closeness to God—in daily Bible reading, interacting with others, every day life experiences, and especially when dealing with adversity.
