From the Darkroom to the Digital Age: Trusting God in Every Season

While flipping through a book called *Church Signs*, looking for inspiration for our sign out front, one quote caught my eye—so much so that it's currently on display:

"Worry is the darkroom in which negatives are developed."

Maybe this quote struck me because of my background in filmmaking. Even in high school, I loved developing film—taking a roll of negatives, winding it onto a reel, and placing it in a canister with chemicals. After processing, you'd hang the negatives to dry, then shine light through them onto special paper to produce a photo.

Today, of course, we just pull out our phones, snap a photo, and see the image instantly. But the metaphor still resonates. Worry truly is like a darkroom—it takes time and energy to develop, and what it produces is often negative. When we worry, we dwell on worst-case scenarios. We focus so much on what could go wrong that we can't see what's going right. In the process, we lose sight of God's hand at work.

This kind of worry can creep into the life of a congregation, especially when facing uncertainty—like wondering who the next pastor will be. It's easy to focus on what we don't know and to become discouraged. But maybe it's time to shift perspectives. Let's move into the digital age, so to speak. Let's lift our eyes, open our hearts, and clearly see what God is doing *right now* in the life of our church.

I once heard it said that worry is like a rocking chair: it gives you something to do, but it doesn't get you anywhere. Paul addresses this in his letter to the Philippians:

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." (Philippians 4:6–7)

Prayer is like our digital camera. It pulls us out of the darkroom and into the light of God's presence. It gives us clarity in the moment and captures snapshots of God's faithfulness.

As summer winds down and we begin a new ministry year, let's enter a season of prayer together. Let's trust God more and worry less. Let's stay out of the darkroom and embrace the light of His presence, knowing that God is already at work in our past, our present, and our future.

May we be a congregation marked not by anxiety, but by confidence—seeing clearly that through Jesus Christ, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, God is faithfully working in all things.
